Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings

Located on the northwest corner of Redding Road and Church Street the house contributes to the historic character of Georgetown Center.

Other Notable Features or Buildings on the Site

The large, well proportioned, L-shaped, picturesque vernacular house is well preserved and is one of the few local examples of the popular 1890s house form. With the exception of the removal of the portion of the wrapping veranda that shelters the façade, the house is well preserved. The side portion of the veranda survives with its heavy turned posts which are also used on the pediment at entrance porch. Large two-over-one sash are used throughout, in the gable end of the façade is filled with a tripartite window. A flat-roofed, octagonal-ended bay opens in the north elevation which also has a cross gable. The house is set on granite, ashlar foundation.

The picturesque vernacular house was built after 1895 by Fred Foster on a lot he purchased from the Osbornes (21:138). The house remained in the family passing to Susie W. Foster in 1931, until 1944 it was sold to Gertrude McIlwain Castle (Mrs. Howard) (46:340). Mr. Castle worked in the Gilbert & Bennett wire mill, for Connery's store in Georgetown Center, and for Louis Miller as a chauffeur and handyman. He passed away about 1950 it was survived by his wife who lived in the house until her own death about 1975. The house is more ambitious than most workers housing and Wilson portion of Georgetown, the village that grew up around Gilbert and Bennett wire cloth factory that located they're in the 1860s.
