#### **Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings**

The pair of houses is located on a dead end street at the south end of the residential district in Georgetown center.

# Other Notable Features or Buildings on the Site

The pair of nearly identical, gable-ended, 3-bay, vernacular dwellings was constructed in 1913. A shallow cornice return accents the façade, and 1-over-1 windows are used throughout, including the gable ends. A once-story bay window opens the west elevation, and each has a full-façade verandah with Tuscan columns. The interiors are arranged on a four-room plan.

### **Historical and Architectural Importance**

The pair of identical, vernacular houses was constructed in 1913 for Eric Ericson on land he purchased from John Linstrom in 1912 (37:441). Linstrom worked for Gilbert & Bennett and

invested his money in land on the south end of New Street. He lived on South Church Street, but his house has been demolished. Many Scandinavians immigrated to Georgetown to work for Gilbert & Bennett Manufacturing Company. Both houses ended up in the Johnson family. They are representative of the commodious worker's housing that dominates the mill village of Georgetown, site of the largest manufacturer of wire cloth and related products.
