### **Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings**

Part of a row of architecturally significant dwellings in the center of the village of Georgetown.

## Other Notable Features or Buildings on the Site

The large, symmetrical, gable-ended, Colonial Revival dwelling built in 1901 is simply detailed with a full-façade, Tuscan-columned verandah and oversized windows with art glass transoms flaking the central entrance bay which is filled with a glazed door and side lights. Two-story, octagonal-ended bay accent each side elevation, and one-over-one windows are used throughout. A balcony has been added to the door (replacing a window) in the gable end. An interesting, hiproofed, fieldstone and shingled garden shed survives in the northwest corner of the property. This was listed as 25 Redding Road in the previous survey.

## **Historical and Architectural Importance**

Mary E. Stanley purchased the lot upon which the house is built from Louis Miller in 1909, and it is assumed that the house was immediately constructed. Mr. Stanley worked for the Gilbert & Bennett Company in the wire mill. In 1962 the house passed to Olive (otherwise known as Carrie)

Miller (Mrs. Louis). She resided in the house to the north (27 Redding Road) until her death in the mid-1970s. It passed from her estate to Roland Mattson, her longtime companion, and is now used as a rental house. Mr. Mattson added the decorative milled trim.
