Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings

The house is located on a corner lot, set close to the road, barn at road to east of house.

Other Notable Features or Buildings on the Site

The nucleus of the present, charming, small house is a three-bay, central entrance cape with an interior chimney. The cornice and shallow returns on the gable ends has transition molding profiles from the ca. 1820 period. It is not known if the twelve-over-eight window sash are original, but they are certainly appropriate. Six-light, half windows are set under the eaves on the façade or north elevation. Coupled twelve-over-nine fill the west gable end and are a Colonial revival improvement. The house has been extended by a lean-to addition on the rear (south) elevation, and a two-section wing on the east. The pilastered frontispiece surrounding the central entrance is a Colonial Revival addition to what was originally a very simple structure.

The small building was apparently erected as a store by Chauncey Keeler ca. 1822. Such stores were once common in Wilton, and several, including the Cannon Store and Middlebrook-Comstock store on the north corner of Nod Hill and Ridgefield Roads, survive. Chauncey, the only son of Isaac Keeler, sold his North Wilton store and one-quarter acre of land to John F. Keeler in 1830, and he in turn conveyed it to James St. John the same year. By 1832 it housed the Bald Hill post office. Benjamin Wheeler acquired the structure in 1836, but when he sold it in 1845, the structure was described as a house and barn rather than a store. The building has had a succession of owners in both the 19th and 20th century. Susan E. Gregory owned it from 1907 until 1920. There have been several owners since Wilhemenia Sieber and Paul Rungsted in the 1920s and 1930s, and many of them added to the house.
