Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings

Set on a rocky steep hilltop lot, the house is oriented to the southeast, with a dramatic vista to the east.

Other Notable Features or Buildings on the Site

The diminutive two-story, three-bay, vernacular dwelling survives basically unaltered. Simply detailed with circular-headed windows in the gable-ends, and six-over-six windows placed functionally rather than symmetrically, the house has an original one-story, lean-to ell on the rear and a shed roofed porch with plain posts shelters the façade. A small-plank-sided outbuilding has been moved up to the east side of the house. The overhanging roof is finished with continuous boxed eaves.

Historical and Architectural Importance

The well preserved, vernacular house was apparently built ca. 1845. Betsy Scribner, wife of Jacob Scribner, and her children Ann, Harriet and William took title to a parcel of land with buildings thereon and bounded on three sided by the highway from Jasper Olmstead (10:50). Betsy conveyed the property to her daughter Ann Scribner Gaines in 1892, and she conveyed it to William F. Scribner (exact relationship unknown; he is possibly her nephew) in 1901. William was a wire weaver for Gilbert & Bennett Manufacturing Company, and the family were members of Zion's Hill Methodist Episcopal Church. The children, including Florence Scribner Youngquist (1898-1986) who inherited the house from her father in 1947, attended Cannondale School. Mrs. Youngquist went on the a few years of school at Norwalk High School and then returned to Cannondale to work for Gregory's General Merchandise Store until she was married. The house is one of the best preserved vernacular dwellings in Wilton, due in large part to it remaining in the same family since 1846. It is currently owned by Florence S. Youngquist's son Kenneth. The house is an important example of 19th century vernacular architecture.
