#### **Interrelationship of Buildings and Surroundings**

Set on a two-acre plot, house is located on the west side of Belden Hill Road, one of the early thoroughfares in Wilton.

### Other Notable Features or Buildings on the Site

The central chimney, three-bay, offset entrance, Federal transitional house is reasonably well preserved. It is finished with a frieze board and cornice returns typical of the period. The handsome, partite frontispiece in the Greek style and pent roof sheltering it are original, but the six panel entrance door and porch posts are not. Most of the original six-over-six windows (one survives) have been replaced with one-over-one sash. A small, shed roofed ell has been added to the east side of the house and a large wing extend it on the rear.

#### **Historical and Architectural Importance**

The traditional federal house appears to have been built between 1835, when Thomas Gilbert acquired the property "of which Isaiah Gregory died possessed," and 1841 Thomas and his wife Lucinda were released from a mortgage given by James Mead. The mortgage release refers specifically to buildings while the earlier transaction does not (7:207, 8:247). It is quite possible that Gilbert mortgaged the property to secure the funds to build a house. J.E. Comstock purchased the house and its two-acre lot from the Gilberts in 1846, and he held it until 1855 (9:84, 10:449). The John Watrous family owned it from 1855 until 1866 when it was conveyed by Mary Watrous to Jonah Keeler (14:273). Julia Hoyt Smith purchased the house from Keeler's estate in 1890 (20:83) and retained ownership until her death in 1922. She willed the house to her sister, Mary L. Winkler, and she, in turn, left it to her nephew George Purple (52:133, 35:55, 20:83). The Grothkopfs sold the property to Clyde and James White in 1952.
