CONTINUATION SHEET: 605 Ridgefield Road, Wilton, CT

### **Interrelationship of Building and Surroundings:**

This house is located on the west side of Ridgefield Road, roughly 0.28-mile northwest of Ridgefield Road's intersection with Linden Tree Road. The house is set back approximately 50' from the road and a gravel driveway leads from the street and runs to the north side of the house where there is a small gravel parking area and a one-and-a-half-story wood-frame garage with a front-facing gambrel roof located 20' north of the residence and connected to it via a covered walkway. The residence is surrounded by a large lawn and extensive plantings and mature trees dot and fill the parcel. A large in-ground pool is located immediately south of the house. A stone wall topped by a solid wood fence lines the boundary of the property flanking the road.

### **Other Notable Features of Building or Site:**

The house at 605 Ridgefield Road is a two-and-a-half-story, wood-frame, Georgian-style residence built ca. 1825. It has a side-gabled roof and is oriented with its ridgeline set roughly north-south parallel to the street. A one-story side-gabled ell adjoins the main block's south (side) elevation, and a two-story side-gabled ell adjoins the north (side) elevation of the main block. A one-story, cross-gable ell adjoins the northwest



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corner of the two-story ell and adjoins the garage via a covered walkway, as noted. There are moderate overhangs of the asphalt-shingled roof at the eaves and rakes and gabled dormers on the east (façade) and west (rear) elevations of the main block. Red brick ridgeline chimneys are centered on the main block and south ell. The house is sheathed with wood shingles. The primary entrance to the house is offset on the north side of the three-bay façade and consists of a paneled wood door flanked by multipane sidelights and wood pilasters, these topped by a molded entablature. Fenestration primarily consists of a mix of six-oversix and 12-over-12 double-hung windows set in plain surrounds, some with operable shutters.

### **Historical and Architectural Importance:**

The earliest known reference to a building on the property is in the 1832 property transfer from Nehemiah "Miah" Northrup to Hezekiah Lyon. The earliest available map of this area, which dates to 1856, identifies this residence as being occupied by an "N. Benedict," this being Isaac N. Benedict, a farmer. The 1860 Federal Census indicates that Benedict was 47 years old and he resided with his 42-year old wife, Emma; three children, Lucy, Frederick, and Arthur, age 18, 17, and 15; and a 74-year old man by the name of Samuel Keeler, who it is presumed was Emma's father. The census identifies Benedict as a man of aboveaverage means as he possessed a farm valued at \$8,000, which was of greater value than most of those living in the area at the time. By the time of the 1880 Federal Census Emma Benedict had died, however, Isaac continued to reside in the house along with Lucy and Frederick, as well as a 55-year old boarder by the name of Mary Watrous. Isaac Benedict appears to have died in 1882 and by 1909, when the next available map of the area was created, the house had passed to a "G.E. Kent," who could not be located in local census records or directories during the period. By the late 1930s the house had been acquired by Arnold J. Thayer, a carpenter. The 1940 Federal Census identifies Thayer as a 51-year old laborer working for the Works Progress Administration and he resided with his 47-year old wife, Evelyn, 25-year old daughter Evelyn Cooke, 31-year old son-in-law, Leslie Cooke, who was a tree worker, and their ten-year old daughter, Marceline. Arnold Thayer died by 1950, when the house was occupied by his widow and a woman by the name of Juanita B. Thayer, whose relationship to Arnold is unclear. Evelyn Thayer appears to have remained in the house through the late 1950s. Despite the addition of the modern ells on the south and north sides of this house by the middle of the  $20^{\text{th}}$  century, this residence retains much of its historic character as a Georgian-style residence, including its essential form and massing. As such, it is significant as an example of Wilton's stock of mid-18th century houses and is illustrative of the typical changes made to these early residences as occupants adapted them to the demands of contemporary living.
